

Director's Notes

Patience was first performed on 23rd. April 1881 and ran for 578 performances. It was a great success from the first, although these days it seldom gets the credit it deserves. Chronologically, it falls between "The Pirates of Penzance" and "Iolanthe" and critically into the general bracket of 'not "Utopia Limited" or "The Grand Duke", but not one of the favourites either'. This seems a bit unfair. It is structurally very elegant; the characters are well defined and the dialogue is among the best of the early end of the G&S canon. Musically, it marks a step away from the grand opera origins of "Pirates", for example, with fewer solo arias and a greater emphasis on ensembles.

Above all, it is a sparkling satire on the foolishness of fashionable idolatry. Since this is as true today as it was in the 1880's, there is no reason why the show should not remain as funny and relevant now as it was then. The Pre-Raphaelite movement was a prime target for satirists from the 1870's onwards, culminating in the excesses and eccentricities of Oscar Wilde, Aubrey Beardsley and James McNeil Whistler at the end of the century. While the Aesthetics were easy to satirise, it is worth bearing in mind that some of the satire arose (as it always does) from fear. Established order and the puritan qualities of late Victorian England, with their stress on family values, hard work, thrift and prosperity for those who deserved it are all themes that ring a resounding bell today. It does not take a lot of imagination to see what kind of threat the emotional flamboyance of Aestheticism might pose to those ideals.

In this production we have restored the second verses of the Dragoons chorus "The Soldiers of our Queen" and Patience and Angela's duet "Long Years Ago". Both of these were originally cut shortly after the opening night amid complaints that Act 1 was too long. Since the total time lost is about three minutes, and restoring the duet at least helps to explain Patience's obsession with Grosvenor, I hope you will forgive this decision, Apart from that, we have let the show speak for itself. I hope you enjoy the performance and maybe feel that this underrated gem deserves a better reputation.

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

After one too many in The




Kathleen Wright



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
