This arrangement enables up to six people, working in the same room, to share the use of two exchange lines or two PBX extensions.

As there is no intercommunication or signalling between telephones, the arrangement is best suited to open plan office working.



Exchange line or PBX extension 1

Main telephone 1

Bell rings in this telephone for calls on line 1



Extension telephone

This telephone has no bell, and is normally connected to one particular line



Main telephone 2

Bell rings in this telephone for calls on line 2



Exchange Line or PBX extension 2

How it operates

The telephones are divided into two groups. One group is normally connected to the first line, and the other group to the second line. When the handset is raised and a button is pressed on any telephone it is switched from its own line to the other groups line.

The main telephone of each group contains a bell. One rings for calls on the first group's line, and the other for calls on the second.

Any member of a group answers a call on his group's line simply by raising his handset, and on the other group's line by raising his handset and pressing the button.

In the same manner, calls can be made on either line.

Facilities

Two exchange lines or two PBX extensions can be used by two to six telephones.

A call can be made or answered on either line from any telephone.

Once the call is in progress, any of the other telephones can join the line and take over the call.

The two lines can be in use at the same time without overhearing.

General information

The telephones are available in two-tone grey, ivory, and black.
