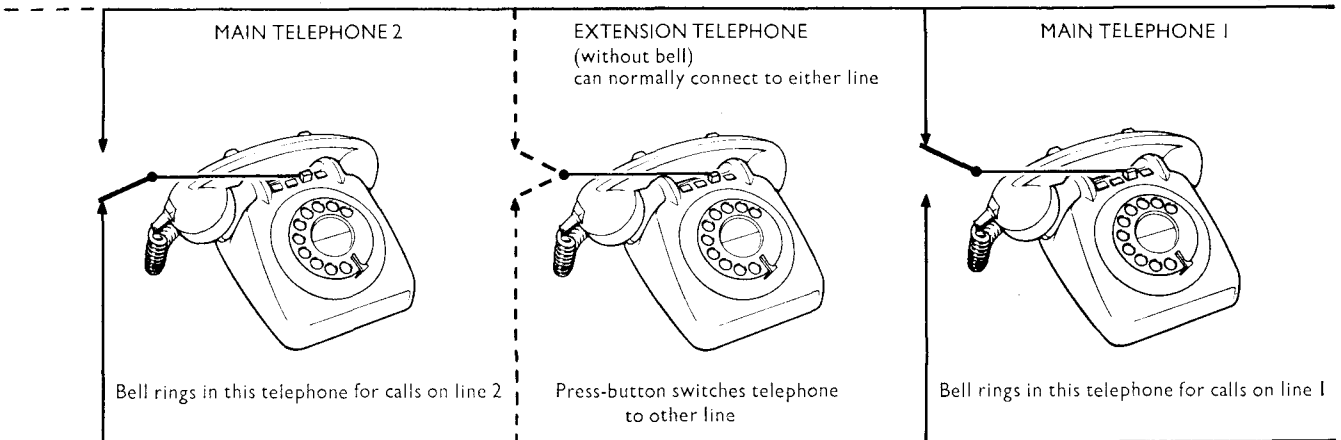

ARRANGEMENTS AND
PRESS-BUTTON SYSTEMS

This extension arrangement is useful for two small groups of people working together in the same room. Any one of up to six telephones can instantaneously pick up either of two exchange lines (or either of two PBX extensions) by press-button. There is no inter-communication or signalling between the telephones. The modern press-button telephones are available in black, two-tone grey, and ivory.





FACILITIES

Two exchange lines (or PBX extensions) can be used by two to six telephones.

The two main telephones each contain a bell; one rings for the first line and the other rings for the second line, so that incoming calls can be identified.

Each telephone is connected to one of the lines as its normal line. The press-button is used to switch the telephone to the other line.

Calls can be made or answered on either line by any telephone.

The two exchange lines can be in use by two different telephones at the same time without overhearing.

Once a call has been made or answered by one of the telephones, any of the other telephones can join the line and take over the call.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The most useful arrangement is to divide the telephones into two groups. The first group is connected to line one and uses the button to get line two; the other group is on line two and uses the button to get line one. In this way calls go direct to the right group whenever its line is free, and the alternative line can be used when it is not.
